PARTICIPATION RIGHTS

The age of the WAG gymnasts was 14 or 15 years old (born 2010 or 2011)

PARTICIPATION WITH A TEAM

The top 36 Federations, based on the All-Around ranking results of the Qualifications from the 2nd FIG Artistic Junior World Championships in Antalya (TUR) were permitted to send a team of two (2) to three (3) gymnasts and one (1) reserve gymnast.

INDIVIDUAL PARTICIPATION

All other Federations in good standing were permitted to send one (1) WAG gymnast.

16 Federations participated for the first time in these Junior World Championships.






Medals' Distribution by Continents




Comparison of highest/lowest Final scores – all 4 apparatus in the Qualifications

Extreme D- and E- Scores in the Qualifications








Group of 1st VT




D-score 1st and 2nd Vault in detail

of gymnasts who performed the following D-score




E-score 1st and 2nd Vault






Detail D-Score






Detail D-Score





Detail D-Score



8. JUDGING ACTIVITIES


Numbers and Federations - 47 Federations were represented by 52 judges.

D-position: BEL, COL, EGY, GBR, NED, PAN, UKR, PER

Categories of the 52 judges

- 9 Category I (including the 8 D-Panel Judges)
- 30 Category II
- 13 Category III

All federations received at least one E position.



Judges' Review Session (Instruction) and Judges' Draw

The WTC dedicated significant time to preparing the PPT's for the judges' instruction. Three exercises on each apparatus for the E evaluation plus Artistry routines on BB and FX were published in STS in advance for the preparation of the judges.

D and E-judges were provided with separate instructions in preparation for the competition.

During the judges' instruction, the AS's presented specific aspects of each apparatus. The WTC's evaluations of the exercises published in STS were presented. Additionally, three E routines on each apparatus were presented.

The Judges' instruction, the Judges' briefings, and the draws were all held successfully.

Assessment of the Judging

D- Panel

The D-Jury was drawn in advance. All D Panel judges evaluated the gymnasts by correctly applying the criteria according to the Code of Points.

E- Panel

The E-Jury was drawn from the judges in attendance during the judges' instruction meeting and the judges' briefings. For Apparatus Finals, only neutral Category 1 and 2 judges were included in the draw. It was a good opportunity for many Federations to participate with a judge, enabling these judges to gain valuable experience.

The JEP results of each competition phase were analysed to understand the performances of the judges' panels. All exercises from the All-Around Final and Apparatus Finals were evaluated by the WTC (PCVR).

Judges' placement

The Judges' panels and Apparatus Supervisors were seated around the apparatus on the field of play and were separated by dividers.

Line judges on vault and floor were seated at the end of the judges' tables on the field of play and evaluated the performances utilising a live video system.



9. COACHES

Number and gender of coaches

The WTC continued to track the gender distribution of registered coaches to provide statistical data on gender equality. There was a total of 60 coaches, among them 36 females and 24 males.

It was promising to see new coaches in attendance, which is positive for the future of our discipline.

10. VENUE AND APPARATUS

Competition format:

Team Qualifications: 2 or 3 gymnasts could compete with the 2 highest scores considered for the team ranking.

Team “touch” warm-up and work order:

With groups that were comprised of two teams, the first team completed the “touch” warm-up and immediately competed. Then the second team completed the “touch” warm-up and competed. The teams did not alternate from one rotation to the next.

With Mixed groups comprised of individuals, these gymnasts completed their “touch” warm-up as one group and competed as one group.

Apparatus

The presence of FIG Apparatus Commissioner, Jakob Raab, was very important and the WTC would like to thank him for his assistance throughout the competition.

Apparatus supplier

The apparatus was supplied by “Taishan”.
